An introduction to the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act and related legislation in other countries

Over the past decade, the anti-corruption movement has gained significant momentum. When the US Foreign Corrupt Practices Act ('FCPA') was passed in 1977, the United States stood alone in prohibiting bribery of foreign public officials. Then, in 1997, over 30 additional countries joined the anti-corruption movement by signing the OECD's Convention on Combating Bribery of Foreign Public Officials in International Business Transactions. Currently, 38 countries have signed the Convention, obligating them to pass legislation also prohibiting bribery of foreign public officials. The OECD's Working Group on Bribery shepherds an active dialogue among these 38 countries.

At this session, James Parkinson, a partner at the Washington DC law firm of BuckleySandler LLP, and James Tillen, a partner at the Washington DC law firm of Miller & Chevalier Chtd, will describe the FCPA and parallel anti-corruption legal regimes, and offer some insights into this exciting and dynamic area of legal practice.
